<u>Books</u>

• Anslinger, Leisa. <u>Here Comes Everybody! Whole Community Catechesis in the</u> <u>Parish</u>. Mystic, CT: Twenty-third Publications, 2004.

In this book, Ainslinger leads catechetical and pastoral leaders through implementation of whole community catechesis. She provides a practical approach to whole community catechesis from her experience of implementing the framework in her home parish. It illustrates the Catechumenate as model, discipleship, households of faith, assemblies, catechetical options, team formation and suggestions for assemblies. Publication includes discussion questions at the end of each chapter and could be used to explore possibilities of the whole community catechesis model in a parish.

• <u>At Home with the Word: Sunday Scriptures and Scripture Insights</u>. Chicago, IL: Liturgy Training Publications.

This annual resource contains the texts of the Sunday readings for the liturgical year, the responsorial psalms, and scripture reflections. It also includes questions for study and discussion. It is a good resource for developing a "Question of the Week."

• Bergant, Diane, with Richard Fragomeni. <u>Preaching the New Lectionary</u>. (Three Volumes: Year A, B, C) Collegeville, MN: Liturgical Press, 1999, 2000, 2001.

The Lectionary is made up of selected passages from the Bible, placed within a literary and liturgical context. This new context calls for a consideration of the liturgical character and setting of the Lectionary readings. Preaching the New Lectionary: Year A offers readers that interpretation.

Preaching the New Lectionary is unique. First, it employs a literary-liturgical way of interpreting all the readings of each Sunday and major feasts of the liturgical year, including the often overlooked responsorial psalm. Second, it explicitly situates the interpretation of each day within the theology of its respective liturgical season. This theology is drawn from the specific themes of the readings that comprise that particular year rather than from more general themes associated with the season. The meaning of the entire season becomes the context for understanding the individual parts of it. Third, the lections are also read in sequential order from the first Sunday of that season to the last. This reading interprets the function of the literary forms, thus providing yet another way of interpreting the riches of the readings.

It offers creative insights for those involved in the liturgical preparation for the celebration of feasts and seasons. It can also act as a valuable resource for liturgical catechesis. The material in Preaching the New Lectionary contributes toward enhancing the liturgical lives of the faithful.

 Birmingham, Mary. <u>Word and Worship Workbook</u>. (Three Volumes: Year A, B, C). New York: Paulist Press, 1998, 1999, 2000.

A comprehensive liturgical, scriptural and catechetical resource designed to explore the meaning and implication of the seasons, feasts and the Sunday liturgies of each cycle.

• Brehm, David. Celebrate the Sunday Readings. Orlando, FL: Harcourt Religion Publishers, 2000. (Cycles A,B,C available separately.)

This large-format book contains a lectionary-based service for each week of the year with additional services for major feasts and seasons of the Church year. There are more than fifty creative, engaging 20-30 minute prayer services for children in grades kindergarten through six. The services can be adapted for children's Liturgy of the Word, special events, classroom

use, times of reflection and days of retreat. DREs, teachers, liturgy planners, musicians, pastors and deacons will all want to use this book.

 Casey, Kathleen, Cronin, Gaynell, et al. <u>Whole Community Catechesis: Bringing It All</u> <u>Home</u>. Orlando: Harcourt Religion Publishers, 2004.

A collection of articles on various aspects of whole community catechesis by leaders in the field. Topics include and overview of the whole community catechesis framework, liturgical integration, family, and community.

 Chesto, Kathleen. <u>FIRE: Family Based Intergenerational Religious Education</u>. Liguori, MO: Liguori, 1988.

This program has 5 years worth of books – each book is one year of religious education to be used by groups of families who form community together and meet in each others' homes.

<u>Playing, Learning, Praying, Parish Tools for Gathering Families</u>. Liguori, MO: Liguori, 1999.

This is a resource to use with FIRE (above) or on it's own. These are large group gatherings for intergenerational groups. A great resource for getting started in that you can use one or two of these gatherings alone.

<u>Rituals and Icebreakers: Practical Tools for Forming Community</u>. Liguori, MO: Liguori Publications, 1999.

Practical resource for small-group programs, this book of presentation-starters for classes and other group activities is a practical, yet profound tool that will help youth group leaders, parish DRE's, and family education program leaders transform a simple gathering of individuals into a faith community.

• Donohue, John. <u>Hearing the Word of God—Reflections on the Sunday Readings</u>. (Three volumes: Year A, B, C). Collegeville, MN: Liturgical Press, 2003, 2004, 2005.

As a distinguished New Testament scholar and preacher, Donahue is the perfect guide to the Sunday Scripture readings in the Year B. Behind his concise and always fresh comments on the texts are his many years of research on Mark's Gospel and his remarkable ability to bring it to bear on Christian life today. This volume is a great resource for all who pray and preach on Scripture.

For use with a large group (20-30 families) – this program covers the bible in 3 years with nice story books for home use and intergenerational activities for once a month parish based gatherings.

"Forming Ministers for Whole-Community Faith Formation" is a new kind of ministry manual for a fresh approach to community faith development. Because more adults are seeking formation, the movement is toward integrated ministry. In the past parishes implemented compartmentalized ministries — each having a specific job that rarely interfaced with other ministries. Catechists were *here*, liturgical ministries were *there*, community outreach was *elsewhere*, and the parish administration, support, and pastoral staff were entities unto themselves. Today, integrating ministry shifts the paradigm from isolation to collaboration.

Echoing a call from Vatican Council II for adult-centered faith formation, today's church leaders are strengthening the resolve to provide life-long formation in discipleship that is liturgically grounded and mission focused. Findings in the recent National Study on Youth and Religion show that the most powerful force affecting the faith lives of youth is the presence of faith-filled adults, adults whose faith practices serve as models and who immerse their families in the culture of a practicing community. More parishes realize that the future of the church is not just in the formation of children but also in the ongoing formation of adults who all — parents, aunts, uncles, grandparents, friends, and ministry leaders — take on catechetical roles in the community. This shift requires much more coordination, communication, and shared planning among ministry leaders.

In addition to training that provides ministers with mechanical ministry tools, parish ministers also need ongoing spiritual formation. Because the activities of the church are directed toward the liturgy and flow from its powers, the liturgical year is the natural source for faith formation (see *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy* #10; from the documents of Vatican II). As we join in the Eucharistic celebration and share the communal meal, we are called to become the bread broken and the cup poured out for others. All formation explores the meaning of this mystery on ever-deepening levels.

A feature of this publication, which includes a CD with PowerPoint presentations, is adult catechetical gathering outlines in English and in Spanish.
