Begin with the Parable of the Rich Young Man read to the group aloud:

Reader:

A Reading from the Gospel of Matthew (19:16-22)

And someone came to Him and said, "Teacher, what good thing shall I do that I may obtain eternal life?"

And He said to him, "Why are you asking Me about what is good? There is only One who is good; but if you wish to enter into life, keep the commandments."

Then he said to Him, "Which ones?" And Jesus said, "YOU SHALL NOT COMMIT MURDER; YOU SHALL NOT COMMIT ADULTERY; YOU SHALL NOT STEAL; YOU SHALL NOT BEAR FALSE WITNESS;

HONOR YOUR FATHER AND MOTHER; and YOU SHALL LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOR AS YOURSELF."

The young man said to Him, "All these things I have kept; what am I still lacking?"

Jesus said to him, "If you wish to be complete, go and sell your possessions and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me."

But when the young man heard this statement, he went away grieving; for he was one who owned much property.

"\$3.00 Worth of God"1

[Shopper walks into the store, Shop Owner has an apron on and greets from behind a table.]

Shop Owner: Good Morning! Shopper: Good Morning!

Shop Owner: Is there anything I can help you with today?

Shopper: Well, yes. I see that you have large and small of a lot of things...but

I am looking for just a pinch of something, is that possible?

Shop Owner: Well, I guess that depends on what it is. . .

Shopper: Well, I would like to purchase three dollars worth of God, please.

Shop Owner: Excuse me?

Shopper: Three dollars worth of God, please.

Shop Owner: Are you sure all you want is three dollars worth.

Shopper: Three dollars, exactly. No more, no less.

I want just enough that it is convenient.

I certainly don't want so much God that it becomes overwhelming

or I have to make any giant changes in my life.

No, three dollars is just enough to say I have God, but not enough

that having God becomes a problem for me. . .

Shop Owner: A problem for you?

Shopper: I want enough God that I feel reassured that in case of emergency I

have God in my back pocket. . .

So that God is there for important events like weddings and baptisms, but not so that it is a part of everything I do. . I want God to be with me like an insurance policy. . . comforting like warm blanket or a cup of cocoa. . .

But if emergency strikes, I'll have just enough to get by. . .

Shop Owner: Have you given any consideration to buying a larger dose of God?
