A Letter to Pope Francis from Archbishop William E. Lori

Most Holy Father,

In the first Chrism Mass homily you delivered as pope, you challenged priests the world over to be "shepherds living with the smell of the sheep." Priests need to go to the "outskirts," you said, "where there is suffering, blood-shed, blindness that longs for sight, and prisoners in thrall to many evil masters."

The people of the Archdiocese of Baltimore give thanks that throughout the 50 years of your own priesthood, you have shown us what it means to accompany others and bring God's mercy to the "peripheries."

Whether among the poor in the slums of Buenos Aires, with prisoners in jails around the world, or in solidarity with refugees and immigrants from war-ravaged lands, you have shown how to live a Christ-centered life focused on the needs of others.

A priest's ministry is not about glorifying himself. It must be focused on glorifying God and serving others.

The faithful of the Archdiocese of Baltimore, the Premier See of the United States, take seriously your call to encounter people wherever they are and in whatever circumstances they find themselves.

In the pages that follow, you will find heartfelt prayers in thanksgiving for the gift of your priesthood. You will also find messages from priests, deacons, religious and lay faithful reflecting on the many ways they evangelize, welcome the stranger, build a culture of inclusion, promote the sanctity of all life, protect creation, share God's mercy and cultivate holy priests.

We pray that the Lord continues to bless your priesthood and that your example inspires many more to pursue the path to holiness.

Given the rise of those who are not affiliated with any religion, coupled with a decline in Mass attendance and sacramental practice, many of those who lead evangelization efforts in the Archdiocese of Baltimore and its parishes recognize the need for a new apologetics and a heftier catechesis that addresses, among other things, the loss of trust brought on by scandal, questions about faith and science, and questions about meaning arising from the breakdown of relationships in society.

Thus, there is need to till the soil so as to plant anew the seed of the Gospel in the hearts of lifelong Catholics, the disaffected and the searching. In the meantime, every effort is being made to raise up a well-formed dedicated corps of missionary disciples throughout the Archdiocese and to mobilize all the resources of nature and grace at the Archdiocesan level and in our parishes, putting them at the service of the Church's mission to spread the Gospel. The vision and direction of such pastoral outreach is rooted in "Evangelii Gaudium" as reflected in Archbishop William E. Lori's first pastoral letter, "A Light Brightly Visible."

His pastoral letter, "A Light Brightly Visible: Guiding the Path to Missionary Disciple-ship," issued in July 2015, lays out a blueprint to re-evangelize the local church. Among other items, it articulates vibrant liturgy, good preaching, hospitality and outreach as basic pastoral priorities.

In celebration of Pope Francis' 50th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood, the faithful of the Archdiocese of Baltimore pledge to the Holy Father to remain committed to creating missionary disciples and to spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ, and we pledge these prayers to that goal.

For the past 5 years, I have served as a volunteer Youth Minister. Encouraged by your Synod on Youth, I have focused my work more and more on accompanying middle and high school students to help them foster and strengthen their personal relationship with Jesus Christ. By working more to listen and then talk, I seek to help these teens grow in their love and fidelity to Christ. We have taken as our Youth Ministry motto what you told a teenager in Chicago when she asked you what you wanted teens to know. You said, "I don't want you to walk alone." I DON'T WALK ALONE is the motto of my ministry and I seek to accompany these teens through wherever our journey to Christ takes us. God bless your ministry and thank you for the work you do to ensure the safety and value of these children.

Racism manifests itself in racial and ethnic violence or the resurgence of hatred – these blatant offenses against the dignity and humanity of people of color, or more subtly in the systemic racial inequities that persist in our current society — in the criminal justice system, in employment, education, housing, healthcare and political enfranchisement.

"The national conversation confirms that there is still a great deal of work to be done," Archbishop William E. Lori said in a 2019 pastoral reflection, "The Journey to Racial Justice: Repentance, Healing and Action." It was his second pastoral reflection in two years on the topic of racism.

The evil of racism has long infected the City of Baltimore and its environs. The systemic effects of racism are evident in the local community. The Archdiocese of Baltimore joins with civil leaders and other leaders of faith communities to address not only the particular impact of racism in our community, but also to address the systemic changes needed to move people out of poverty.

The Church also welcomes immigrants, with several parishes opening their doors to those coming from other countries and providing services to help people acclimate to the area, no matter the continent from which they came, especially Central America, Africa and Southeast Asia. Catholic Charities in the Archdiocese, through its Esperanza Center, provides food, as well as employment training, legal assistance and other services to help immigrants and other indigenous persons integrate into society.

Ground has been broken for the first new Catholic school in Baltimore City in nearly 60 years, and it will be named for Mother Mary Lange, herself an immigrant from the Caribbean who established the first school for girls of color in 1828 in Fells Point, Maryland, and founded the Oblate Sisters of Providence the following year.

The Archdiocese appreciates its long history of being built upon the foundations laid by early colonists and later waves of immigrants, including, sadly, some enslaved persons. But the Archdiocese of Baltimore works today to right the wrongs of the past and build toward a future that welcomes people from all parts of the globe.

In celebration of Pope Francis' 50th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood, the faithful of the Archdiocese of Baltimore pledge to the Holy Father to welcome the stranger in our midst, to fight for systemic change that lifts all people and to be a beacon for all. We pledge these prayers to those goals.

The Archdiocese of Baltimore strives to advocate with the faithful, the broader community and in public policy for an "integral human ecology" as set forth in Pope Francis' encyclical, "Laudato Si'."

The archdiocese reaches from the Chesapeake Bay to the mountains of Western Maryland. Given the ecological diversity of the region and the reliance of so many people on the fruits of the land and water, the Church supports efforts to care for our common home. Several projects in the Archdiocese support those efforts, including these examples:

- At Immaculate Conception School in Towson, 130 fourth- and fifth-graders made positive changes to the health of the environment with the help of a \$5,000 grant from the Chesapeake Bay Trust Fund. The students planted 150 native perennials on campus, reducing parking lot runoff. The fourth-graders surveyed the local habitat and focused on sustainable energy at their science fair project. The fifth-graders engineered water filters for their project. Both grades assessed the health of Deep Run Stream at Meadowood Regional Park.
- Our Lady of Mount Carmel School in Essex partnered with the Gunpowder Valley Conservancy to create rain gardens and micro-bioretention ponds to handle stormwater runoff from more than 10,000 square feet of roof, which makes its way through Middle River into the Chesapeake Bay. Native plants with root systems reaching some 30-feet deep allow for natural water filtration, while attracting pollinators such as butterflies. Staff are evaluating how best to use those enhancements in the science curriculum.
- The Shrine of St. Anthony in Ellicott City boasts a large array of solar panels and the Archdiocese of Baltimore works with Constellation Energy on a solar project that is expected to meet approximately 20 percent of the Archdiocese's electricity needs. The Shrine of St. Anthony also hosts Little Portions Farm, a collaboration between the Conventual Franciscans at the Shrine of St. Anthony, a local farmer and the Franciscan Center in Baltimore, whose food program will receive the fresh produce grown on three acres of the shrine's farmland. The shrine's farm includes a rotation of crops throughout the year and features a herd of Red Devon cows to help return the fields to their native state after the prior use of chemicals.
- The Archdiocese also cooperates with First Fruits Farm, which grows food to give away to food banks and the poor. The farm has utilized land owned by the Archdiocese to grow crops and several Catholic parishes and schools volunteer to harvest the crops that will be distributed.

In celebration of Pope Francis' 50th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood, the faithful of the Archdiocese of Baltimore pledge to the Holy Father to care for our common home through a variety of projects. We pledge these prayers to supporting the earth and the environment.

Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish and Schools, located close to the Chesapeake Bay, have just completed a year of environmental best practices – planting trees, two rain gardens, a bay scape garden and 3 micro-bioretention gardens and installing 4 rain barrels to make our property "Bay-wise certified." Our curriculum now includes formal learning about protecting Mother Earth and our Student Environmental Club and our Parish Water and Garden Keepers group both help maintain these gardens. We work closely with the Interfaith Partners of the Chesapeake to ensure our efforts are tied into protecting God's creation and relaying this message to our students and parishioners.

On fundamental questions of safeguarding human life, the situation in the Archdiocese of Baltimore is mixed. In public opinion polls, more and more Americans, especially teenagers and young adults, seem to recognize the importance of the sanctity of life. The turnout of young people from the Archdiocese for the annual March for Life in Washington, D.C., is impressive and grows every year. The state of Maryland has sought to expand its pro-abortion laws in the last year, since some supporters of abortion rights fear that the Supreme Court of the United States will reduce or eliminate the law allowing "abortion on demand" in future years.

The Archdiocese encourages support of pro-life pregnancy centers that help women in crisis pregnancies, and has supported women seeking healing after an abortion through outreach efforts including Project Rachel. Proponents of physician assisted suicide have attempted to have the Maryland Legislature pass a law allowing the practice. They have been unsuccessful for the last three years, but the initiative very nearly succeeded this year. They have vowed to try again in the coming legislative session and the Church will continue to oppose these efforts.

With other pro-life groups in Maryland, the Respect Life Office organizes an annual March for Life in the state capital of Annapolis attended by 1,500 people. The Archdiocese promotes and assists in legislative efforts that promote the sanctity of human life. The Archdiocese also promotes research into the use of adult stem cells to create new and effective treatments for illnesses, while resisting the use of embryonic stem cells.

The Archdiocese provides ongoing outreach to those with developmental disabilities, sponsoring special summer camps called Camp GLOW.

In celebration of Pope Francis' 50th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood, the faithful of the Archdiocese of Baltimore pledge to the Holy Father to continue to advocate for the sanctity and dignity of all life from conception to natural death. We pledge these prayers to supporting those facing the end of life in terminal illness and to ending violence that harms people, the scourge of abortion and the use of the death penalty.

As a nurse case manager, I talk to our elderly people every day to offer encouragement to them, to guide them in their medical care, and to assist in obtaining what they need to survive. They are so often alone and afraid. I continue to pray for the conversion of all the people of the United States to embrace the value of life, and to eliminate laws that allow the murder of so many of our children through abortion. Please pray for our leaders to be effective in achieving this goal!

In the Archbishop's view, the reality of sin and the urgency of conversion is not well understood even by those who regularly attend Mass, and thus needs to be preached with greater vigor — not with harshness but with genuine pastoral love. During the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy, celebrated December 8, 2015, to November 20, 2016, the Archdiocese designated eight churches as places of pilgrimage with a holy door: the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Cathedral of Mary Our Queen in Baltimore; the National Shrine of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, Emmitsburg; the Shrine of St. Anthony, Ellicott City; St. Ignatius (the historic church), Hickory; St. John the Evangelist, Frederick; St. Mary, Annapolis; and the Shrine of Ss. Peter and Paul, Cumberland.

The designated holy doors in these churches were opened with special ceremonies Dec. 13, 2015. Pilgrims who crossed through one of the Archdiocese's eight Holy Doors, or Doors of Mercy, and fulfilled the other necessary conditions, were granted a Jubilee indulgence according to Church's discipline.

Individual celebration of the Sacrament of Penance is offered in all parishes each week and in some parishes on a daily basis. Most parishes offer Confession on Saturday afternoon, but others offer it prior to Sunday Mass. The faithful are invited to make appointments with their parish priest for Reconciliation outside the regular weekly times. All seminarians gain pastoral competence through supervised ministry in distinct settings, such as: social justice and the corporal works of mercy; teaching; health care and evangelization. Those aspiring for the permanent diaconate engage in charitable works of mercy, as the diaconate is essentially a ministry of service and mercy.

In March 2016, during the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy, Archbishop Lori led a group of interfaith leaders from Baltimore on pilgrimage to the Holy See to pray for healing in the City of Baltimore following days of unrest and violence after the funeral for a young man who died while in police custody in 2015. The group was cordially received by Pope Francis and it met with various dicasterial officials. The group included representatives of other Christian denominations, such as the local Lutheran bishop and representatives of Baptist and Methodist congregations, as well as Muslim and Jewish faith communities who had joined together to work for peace and healing.

In celebration of Pope Francis' 50th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood, the faithful of the Archdiocese of Baltimore pledge to the Holy Father to perform the Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy throughout the Archdiocese. We pledge these prayers as a testament that we will share God's mercy with all those whom we meet.



Archbishop Lori and the Director of Vocations desire to create an environment amongst the faithful of the Archdiocese that promotes vocations to the priesthood and religious life. Posters and prayers cards that include pictures and names of each seminarian are annually distributed to churches, Catholic schools, university Catholic centers, youth and young adult ministers, and Catholic lay organizations and retreat centers.

The basic principle of spiritual formation is "to live in intimate and unceasing union with God the Father through his Son, Jesus Christ, in the Holy Spirit" (PPF106). The spirituality of a priestly way of life is characterized by prayer, celibate chastity, mature obedience, simplicity of life and social justice in imitation of Jesus Christ. "For every priest his spiritual formation is the core which unifies and gives life to his being priest and his acting as a priest" (PDV, no. 45).

A priest is called first to be, and then sent, as a man of prayer and a leader of prayer. "A life of steady prayer first and foremost centered in the sacraments, especially the Eucharist, the Liturgy of the Hours and the liturgical cycles, but also in prayer that is personal and devotional" is necessary for true spiritual formation, (cf. PPF 26).

Pastoral formation helps seminarians understand the dynamics of Catholic parishes in the Church today and learn how to apply their theological and pastoral education to the realities of parish life. For that purpose, select local parishes are the sites of pastoral training for every seminarian. The Pastoral Formation Program includes five integrated components: parish ministerial service, academic courses, seminary workshops, faculty mentoring and pastoral team learning. Pastoral formation guides a seminarian in the process of becoming a good leader and a good shepherd in imitation of Christ.

Pastoral formation in the pre-theology program occurs through direct ministry experiences with the poor and suffering, as seminarians examine how and where God is present in such situations.

Priests have the opportunity for continual renewal through retreats, days of reflection and other opportunities for prayer. There is healthy and effective collaboration between the laity and priests in the Archdiocese. A major pastoral responsibility of Archdiocesan priests is to develop, guide and empower laity for ministry. On the parish level, the expertise and involvement of the laity is utilized through membership on collaborative bodies such as the parish's Finance Council, Pastoral Council, and Board of Corporators. The role of the Parish Pastoral Council is evolving into a body engaged in pastoral planning and assisting the pastor in formulating a vision for the parish.

In celebration of Pope Francis' 50th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood, the faithful of the Archdiocese of Baltimore pledge to the Holy Father to encourage others to follow his path of commitment to the service of the People of God. We pledge these prayers in support of vocations discernment and in support of happy, healthy and holy priests and other ministers for God's Church.


