
## Dear Friends in Christ,

We have all had that moment when we walked into a party, a class, or some other group event and realized we didn't know a single person in the room. There is a feeling of the unknown and thoughts come flooding in like, what do I do now? or where is so and so who told me they would be here? We may even consider, should I just leave? Then there is usually that moment of relief when someone comes up and begins a conversation. It's like a pinpoint of light in the darkness.



As the pastor of Saint Katharine Drexel parish in Frederick, I strive to be the person who starts the conversation when someone new walks into our parish. Today I am so grateful to be able to say that, over time, we began to see more and more African immigrants at Mass, and eventually an African Faith Community group was formed. Today, they have over 200 members, and our parish has an immigrant outreach and formation coordinator who helps the group plan events and become more integrated into parish life, especially our sacramental preparation programs. This coordinator was made possible in part through our Annual Appeal parish rebate.

Now, before you start wondering if this is something you can do at your parish, please reach out to your pastor and ask what has been done with the parish sharing funds raised through the Annual Appeal for Catholic Ministries. You see, the gifts that you are giving to support the Annual Appeal go to aid the programs and ministries that serve the people and parishes within our archdiocese. Your pastor will probably say something like, "We have a new roof" or "We had Vacation Bible School last summer".
