The Gift of Friendship

Parents want nothing but positive and nurturing relational experiences for our children. In a perfect world, all people would be inclusive in their speech and actions. Everyone would seek to widen his or her circle of friendship.



Each person would remember that God is our heavenly Father and that we are all brothers and sisters. Humans are far from perfect, however, and often fall short of treating each other as God's children.

During fifth grade, children are often concerned with fitting in with their friends. This is natural, but it can lead to undue stress if children lose sight of what it truly means to be a friend. Remind your child often that friends bring out the best in us, and they don't ask us to go against our conscience.

We cannot protect our children from negative experiences with their peers, but we can teach them to recognize true friendship and appreciate it for the gift that it is.

A true friend is caring, rejoices with us when good things happen for us, supports us when we have a rough time, and inspires us to be better friends ourselves. A true friend carries Jesus inside and shares his love with all.

Lead Your Child to Grow with God: Spiritually, Socially, and Physically

Spiritual Help your child make a habit of looking for the presence of Jesus in those around him or her. When you see the light of God's love in others, say so aloud, and talk about how following the example of Jesus in this way brings us closer to him.

Social Discuss with your child that God is always with us, and look for God's grace in the words and actions of others. Help children understand that they are called to be instruments of God's peace and grace in their interactions with others.

Physical Fifth-graders have lots of energy and are experiencing new physical growth and competence.

Perhaps an elderly neighbor could

use a helping hand with yard work, or maybe someone who is ill needs someone to walk the dog. Encourage your child to do physical work, with your supervision or assistance, to show he or she values others as brothers and sisters in Christ.

Let us remember the three key phrases for living in peace and joy in the family: "May I?" "Thank you," and "Sorry." In our family, when we are not intrusive and ask, "May I?"; in our family, when we are not selfish and learn to say, "Thank you"; and when in a family one realizes he has done something wrong and knows how to say, "I'm sorry"—in such a family there are peace and joy.

In Lesson 3, your child will:


- identify common bullying behaviors and develop anti-bullying values and practices.

Bringing the Lesson Home

Determine ahead of time when and where you and your child will engage with the lesson content. Read or complete Side A of the worksheet with your child.



STEP 1

ENGAGE & EXPLORE

Over the years, you have watched your child grow and develop relationships with family, classmates, teachers, and others. As your child grows and gains more



independence, it's more important than ever to be sure your child knows the difference between friendship and bullying.

SAY: In your life, you're going to meet people who have behaviors that fall into the "bullying" category. It's important to know that you can treat everyone in a friendly way even though sometimes they make bad choices. It's equally as important to know that when someone treats you poorly or unkindly, or makes you feel uncomfortable or bad, it's best to tell a trusted adult so that, together, we can find a solution.

Have an open discussion with your child about ways to be friendly to others but also stay safe. Children need to know when a trusted adult needs to step in and get involved in a potentially dangerous situation.

SAY: My hope for you is that you share the love of Jesus with others simply by offering your friendship, and I hope others do the same for you.

Bringing the Lesson Home (continued)


STEP 2 REFLECT & RESPOND

Read or complete Side B of the worksheet with your child.

SAY: God is our heavenly Father, and each person he creates has the same infinite value. Jesus demonstrated this in the way he lived.

Take some time to discuss with your child a time when someone treated him or her with kindness and respect when it was unexpected. Then share a time when that was done for you. Discuss the effects that had, and point out how every relationship we have brings us closer to who God calls us to be.
